

An Icon Retires from BOCES 2

Jo Anne Antonacci admits that she never dreamed she'd be a District Superintendent one day. As she steps down from this role leading Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES (BOCES 2), she is thankful for the many different opportunities she's had during her 47 years at the organization. "I'm a better person for having worked here," she said. "The experiences I've had, what I've learned, the people I've worked with, they have all led to my betterment. I've had to learn every facet of education, really take a deep dive to understand the needs of those we serve in order for BOCES 2 to be of benefit. I feel like we've always been a team here, that's just part of our culture. I chose to stay for so many years because I believe in the concept of a BOCES. The word 'cooperative' is the key to our success!"

Antonacci got her start working for BOCES 2 as a speech and language teacher in 1977. In 1986, she was promoted to special education supervisor, then director for special education in 1988 and executive director for exceptional children in 1995. She became the assistant superintendent for instructional programs in 1998, then interim chief operating officer in 2005. In 2007, Antonacci was appointed as deputy superintendent, then District Superintendent in 2010. She retired on Aug. 31 this year. As someone who is always looking forward, she changed her perspective for a few moments to reflect on her journey with BOCES 2. While proud of her many accomplishments, several stand out for her, including:

- The Preschool Special Education Program: Although it's been challenging to financially sustain, the program has grown in popularity and prestige. Antonacci is proud to say that BOCES 2 is one of the few, out of 37 BOCES in the state, that offers the program. She credits the BOCES 2 Board and incredible staff for its success.
- The BOCES 2 Capital Project: On Dec. 16, 2014, a \$29,231,100 capital project referendum took place. The vote passed 607-99. This project included renovations to classrooms and offices; creation of professional development and early childhood learning centers; and improvements to security and parking lots. In the summer of 2018, the project was completed. The scope of the project, especially the professional development center, has served component school districts well.



- The Monroe 2-Orleans Educational Foundation: She has seen the continued growth of the foundation made possible by hundreds of active supporters. Over the years, she has witnessed the results of its scholarships to students who have followed non-traditional educational paths and continued their education or job training after graduation. Antonacci has served as the president of the foundation as well as an ex-officio board member in the past. In retirement, she will continue on as an official board member.
- The Activities for Daily Living (ADL) House: Built by Career and Technical Education (CTE) students, the house was the result of a parent's request for a program to help students learn daily living skills in a home environment. "At BOCES 2, we're about meeting the needs of our community," she said. "This was a great example of where there's a will, there's a way. We've been able to collaborate with partners and other agencies to help provide needed services."
- Her work with the Monroe County Interagency Committee: Antonacci cochaired the organization for 10 years along with the assistant superintendent of Monroe One BOCES. This group was the first of its kind, bringing education and multiple agencies together in the interest of Monroe County students.
- The Monroe County ADHD Task Force: The "ADHD Best Practices Manual" that was created by this group was designed to improve communication between home, school and health care providers for children with this disorder.

BOCES 2 Names New District Superintendent



The Monroe 2-Orleans Board of Cooperative Education selected Dr. Thomas K. Putnam as district superintendent and formally appointed him on June 26, 2024. He assumed his new role

on Sept. 1. He succeeded Jo Anne Antonacci, who retired on Aug. 31.

"Dr. Putnam has the diversity of experience necessary to maintain the excellence our BOCES strives for," said BOCES 2 Board President Dennis Laba. "He is well-respected throughout the region and has proven himself as an exemplary leader during his career. We have complete faith in his ability to build upon the foundation Jo Anne has helped create over the past 47 years at BOCES 2."

Putnam was most recently the superintendent of the Penfield Central School District, a position he has held since 2015. He previously served as acting superintendent since July 2014 and as principal of Penfield High School (PHS) for four years. He also served as an assistant principal at PHS and at Greece Olympia High School.

Putnam holds his doctorate in educational leadership from the University of Rochester, his master's degree in curriculum development and instruction technologies from SUNY Albany, and his bachelor's degree in elementary education from SUNY Cortland.

"I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to serve as the next district superintendent of Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES," said Putnam. "I look forward to collaborating with the dedicated faculty, staff, students and component school districts to enhance educational opportunities and to achieve new heights of success together."

Monroe One BOCES District Superintendent Daniel White assisted the BOCES 2 Board as search consultant throughout the process.

"I also truly love working with all our component districts," she said. "I really like assisting them with superintendent searches. It's invigorating to work with board members to identify the best solutions for their districts. I enjoy engaging in problem-solving and celebrating the positive outcomes with individuals." Over the last few months, Antonacci was recognized by multiple component school districts for her work with them.

While her favorite parts of the job were building programs with people, interacting with others and addressing issues in the hopes of obtaining better resolutions, it was frustrating when she realized people didn't fully understand what a BOCES does. "I had to find ways to demonstrate and report the reality of BOCES work: services for all ages and abilities," said Antonacci. She served on many committees with multiple education and community members. Among the most recent acknowledgments of Antonacci's long career was a proclamation in her honor from the Monroe County Legislature at their Sept. 10 meeting.

She said that being one of the few female District Superintendents was sometimes challenging; however, she indicated she was always up for a challenge.

Over the years, Antonacci received various kinds of recognition, nominated by those she worked with. They include:

As to the challenges the future holds for BOCES 2, Antonacci said the focus must be on sustaining programs and continuing to grow. Some programs, such as CTE and Exceptional Children, are expanding so quickly, they are outgrowing their physical spaces. New spaces are being explored, including new leasing agreements and new structures being built. "I'm extremely thankful for the incredible amount of space our components lease to us for program services," she said. She also cites the need to work with community partners to provide a full continuum of services, such as Springdale Farm, Slayton Place, URMC, Roberts Wesleyan University and Paul Road. "Staffing has been our biggest obstacle the last few years," said Antonacci. "You want to provide more opportunities for students, but you can't do that if you don't have the instructional staff to do so."

It's always been about the people for her — employees, students and their families. "Relationships shaped my reason 'why," she said. "Relationships are why I've stayed here all these years. To see students prosper in the hands of committed staff, regardless of their abilities, is what drives me."

Plans for retirement may include a trip to Sicily, where Antonacci would love to delve further into her ancestry; a chance to concentrate on some things she's been unable to do while working full time; overdue house cleaning; and spending more time with family, especially her 1-year-old granddaughter. She will remain active on the foundation board, and she will assist with any transition needs upon the request of the new District Superintendent Dr. Thomas Putnam, who assumed his role on Sept. 1.

"Working here has shaped who I am today," said Antonacci. "When I reflect on the journey I've been on, the lessons I've learned have helped me through life. The families have taught me as much as the students have. I'm still in touch with some. The staff have taught me to appreciate the differences in people, be a better listener, and that a positive attitude will lead to better ways!"

Many Leadership Changes at BOCES 2

BOCES 2 saw many leadership changes as the 2023-24 school year wound down. Here is an overview of some of the familiar and new faces in new places.



Nicole Bell is the new Mid-West RBERN coordinator. She replaces Dr. Sabrina Nudo, who now works for the Syracuse RBERN. Bell has been very active and impactful since arriving at Mid-West RBERN in 2019, including holding a position on the New York State Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (NYS TESOL) Executive Board and receiving her advanced degree, Ed.D. in Education Leadership for Diverse Learning Communities from Molloy University.

Jill Slavny is the new assistant superintendent for accountability, technology and regional services. She replaces Dr. Michelle Ryan, who retired at the end of June. Slavny has 25 years of experience in education. She started as a science teacher in the Alternative Program for Wayne-Finger Lakes BOCES, then became a Teacher on Special Assignment, working as an instructional assistant and science curriculum coordinator, before transitioning to administration. She worked in the

East Rochester Union Free School District for eight years, where she was the assistant principal, then principal of the Jr./Sr. High School. Slavny worked most recently as the BOCES 2 CTE executive principal for 12 years.



Jon Koeng is the new Career and Technical Education (CTE) principal. Koeng (pronounced "king") joins the team as an experienced administrator, coming to BOCES 2 from the Trumansburg Central School District, where he served as a high school principal for 11 years and as a business administrator for three years. Prior to Trumansburg, he was an assistant principal at Webster Schroeder High School. As a person who has always been passionate about career-based learning and

STEAM education, Koeng is thrilled to be taking on the challenge of leading the CTE program. He describes his new position as his dream job, and he is looking forward to getting his hands dirty and getting involved in the amazing things happening in the CTE classrooms.

Held at SUNY Brockport, families and friends gathered to celebrate more than 500 students who learned and mastered industry-aligned skills.



CTE Students Place First in 6 Contests, Medal in 11 at State Competition

The 2024 New York State SkillsUSA Leadership and Skills Championships took place at the New York State Fairgrounds in Syracuse from April 24-26. BOCES 2 Career and Technical Education was represented by more than 80 students as competitors, delegates and event workers. Twenty-five BOCES 2 CTE students combined for 11 medals in the championship competitions, and one student was voted a 2024-25 state officer.

Three students from BOCES 2 CTE placed first in their respective individual competitions: Dental Assisting student Briana Lewis (Brockport) in Dental Assisting; HVAC/ Plumbing student Jordan Fleischer (Lake Ontario Baptist Academy) in HVAC; and HVAC/Plumbing student Owen Donovan (Brockport) in Plumbing.

Three additional team contests were won by BOCES 2 CTE students. Food Services students Caleb Armour (Spencerport) and Kamlya Rosa-Padilla (Greece) finished first in Community Action Basic. Criminal Justice students Emily Ballard (Hilton), Izabella Allison (Spencerport) and Logan Feszczyszyn (Brockport) earned a first-place finish in Criminal Justice Quiz Bowl. Carpentry students Kyle Battaglia (Spencerport), Joshua Ortiz (Spencerport) and Andrew Shurina (Churchville-Chili) teamed up for a first-place finish in Occupational Health and Safety.

Six BOCES 2 CTE students combined for second-place finishes across three state competitions. Individual second-place awards were won by Medical Laboratory Assisting and Phlebotomy student Selki Wilson (Spencerport) in Medical Terminology, and Digital and Visual Communication student Faith Waver (Gates Chili) in Photography. Carpentry students Andrew Burke (Churchville-Chili) and Paul Rose (Brockport); HVAC/Plumbing student Evan Prus (Hilton); and Residential and Commercial Electrical student Ethan Race (Holley) teamed up for a second-place finish in TeamWorks.

Two third-place finishes were won by a combined eight BOCES 2 CTE students. Dental Assisting student Saniyha Harris (Spencerport) won third place in Dental Assisting. Seven Computer Technology students worked together to finish third in Opening and Closing Team: Jacob Chatt (Greece), Aiden Elliott (Kendall), Michai Jones (Wheatland-Chili), Riley Knopp (Holley), Mason Merriam (Holley), TJ Phelan (Gates Chili) and Ashton Streber (Greece).

In addition to the medals, a BOCES 2 CTE student also won a state officer position for next school year. Medical Laboratory Assisting and Phlebotomy student Payal Gajmer (Churchville-Chili) was elected as a 2024-25 New York State SkillsUSA Officer.

Leadership activities are also a core function of the event, and BOCES 2 CTE had two students participating in leadership roles and activities as elected positions. SkillsUSA New York Area 1 Vice President and Dental Assisting student Kayla Waddell-Martin (Greece) participated in one of her final events as a state leader. Medical Laboratory Assisting and Phlebotomy student Savannah Wehner (Spencerport) was elected the 2024-25 Area 1 Vice President at Regionals in March and attended the state conference for leadership purposes as well.

In addition to the elected positions, seven BOCES 2 CTE students represented the BOCES 2 CTE SkillsUSA chapter as delegates: Baking student Julian Rodriguez (Greece); Dental Assisting student Isabelle Nevares (Greece); Criminal Justice students Cooper Moffatt (Churchville-Chili) and McKenzie Chard (Northstar); Digital and Visual Communication students Carina Gadaleta (Greece) and Erin Newton (Spencerport); and Heavy Equipment Operation and Maintenance student Ryan Williams (Brockport).

BOCES 2 CTE students could also be found throughout the event as skilled workers. Heavy Equipment Operation and Maintenance student Matthew Gramling (Greece) could be found with a camera at the event as the chapter photographer. Criminal Justice students Kayla Wiley (Gates Chili) and Mori Thomas (Churchville-Chili) served as contest helpers. Criminal Justice students Jared Romeis (Churchville-Chili) and Matthew Ryan (Spencerport) were a part of the Security Corps for the event. Dental Assisting student Calli Wamser (Greece) helped in the SkillsUSA store that sold merchandise to visitors.

During the Friday awards ceremony, the BOCES 2 CTE SkillsUSA chapter earned recognition of its own, being named a Gold Chapter of Excellence for the fourth year in a row.

Through their performances, 11 BOCES 2 CTE students became eligible to participate in the national conference in June. Lewis, Fleischer and Donovan punched their tickets to nationals with their first-place finishes, as did the Community Action Basic and Occupational Health and Safety teams. Due to the first-place finisher not being able to attend nationals, Wilson represented New York in Medical Terminology. Given their 2024-25 elected positions, Wehner and Gajmer headed to Atlanta to participate in leadership activities.




